TOGETHER IS BETTER

At Sethu, group programmes build connection and confidence. Whether it's splashing joyfully in our **aqua therapy** session or learning upper and lowercase letters in our interactive **handwriting groups**, children and families grow through shared experiences. These programmes not only support skill development but also create a sense of community—where families find strength, encouragement, and belonging.

“Your Beautiful Brain programme feels like an angel's touch... I've learned so much about my daughter's neurodiversity, and in doing so, I've learned so much more about myself.”

Beautiful Brain is a six-session online programme designed for parents of children with ADHD. It focuses on positive behaviour support and strengthening executive functioning skills through interactive activities, group discussions, and real-life examples.

The Activity Club is a new initiative designed to bridge the gap in social opportunities for autistic children. Honouring their unique ways of engaging with the world, the Club creates safe, joyful spaces where children can build friendships, connect with peers, and participate in social, recreational, and cultural activities.



PARENT TO PARENT: PEER SUPPORT FROM THOSE WHO'VE BEEN THERE

This year, 25 trained **parent buddies** walked alongside families of children with autism, offering both guidance and encouragement. Drawing from their own experiences, they shared practical strategies, such as how ADHD medication supported their child's progress or how visual tools transformed daily routines, helping families navigate challenges with greater confidence.

Agle Kadam, our monthly multilingual webinar series, reached 77 families of newly diagnosed neurodivergent children. Facilitated by our Family Advisor, a parent of a neurodivergent child, the sessions helped families take their first steps with confidence.

GROWING CAPACITY TO SUPPORT CHILDREN

This year we conducted **14 webinars** and **16 in-person workshops and presentations** for families, teachers, students, and professionals. Covering topics such as sexuality education, ADHD, inclusive education, and supporting children with challenging behaviour, these sessions combined expertise with lived experiences of parents, making them both practical and relatable.

Our three most attended webinars were

- Ask Me Anything about ADHD
- Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC)
- Challenging Behaviour – Understanding and Supporting your Autistic Child with Compassion and Respect

We also delivered training in childhood sexuality education, equipping professionals and caregivers to support children with disabilities, in ways that are safe, inclusive, and respectful of their dignity. Together, these efforts are strengthening the capacity of families and professionals to create environments where every child is seen, understood, and embraced.

BUILDING INCLUSIVE FUTURES WITH COMMUNITIES

Gnyandeep continues to strengthen its presence across Goa, collaborating with 1,262 Anganwadi workers (AWWs) across 12 talukas, along with families, Mukhya Sevikas, and Child Development Project Officers. With support from **Cipla Foundation**, the programme scaled its efforts this year by distributing 419 assessment kits, conducting 110 onsite visits, hosting five webinars, and providing 50 gas stoves across five talukas to improve Anganwadi infrastructure.

To measure outcomes, follow-up surveys were conducted with 305 AWWs, capturing how training and ongoing support have influenced the wellbeing of children in their care. Project Officers encouraged AWWs to take on developmental screening responsibilities, significantly boosting their confidence and capacity.

The programme's impact is evident in the trust it has fostered. Cipla Foundation's Aryadev joined the team on field visits, underscoring the partnership's commitment. Mukhya Sevikas and AWWs themselves sought guidance for their own families and extended hospitality during visits, clear indicators of the goodwill built through consistent collaboration.

Today, trained AWWs are emerging as champions for early childhood development, identifying developmental delays, supporting parents, and advocating for timely interventions.

CELEBRATING NEURODIVERSITY

We marked the year with events that reminded us that inclusion is not a one-time goal—it's something we celebrate, nurture, and build together.

World Autism Month

Sixteen families came together for a Fun Day packed with obstacle courses, dancing, a magic show, and plenty of smiles. Each family left with memories and a Polaroid keepsake.



ADHD Fun Day

Children, parents, and allies came together for a joyful day of self-expression and connection. Highlights included superhero-themed art that celebrated each child's unique strengths, and a well-being session for parents that honoured individuality and resilience. As one child summed it up: "Everyone is special in their own way."



World Disability Day

Celebrated under the theme "Enthusiasms and Interests – A Door to Endless Possibilities," 18 children explored passion-based zones, from LEGO and art to clay and sensory play. These creative, inclusive spaces celebrated each child's interests and opened pathways to joy, expression, and belonging.



Children's Day

Painting with natural materials and playful games brought out imagination and laughter among 18 children and their families.



Different Abilities, One Community

In partnership with the Office of the Disability Commissioner, Dynanvardhini Divyang Training College, and the Down Syndrome Federation of India, we hosted a statewide poster contest with 100 entries from 89 schools. The finale was a vibrant showcase of games, dance, and talent, highlighting the abilities of individuals with Down syndrome.



Play, Connect, and Thrive

Fourteen families enjoyed an afternoon of shared games, crafts, and relaxed conversation. As one parent said: "I loved the uninterrupted time with my daughter."

CHAMPIONING FAMILY-CENTERED CARE

This year, our message of family partnership reached wider audiences.

An article co-authored by Dr Nandita de Souza and Andre Velho was featured in **India Development Review (IDR)**, Asia's leading platform on social impact. Titled "Why families are key to supporting children with neurodiversity", the piece showcased Sethu's Family-Centred Care (FCC) approach and offered practical guidance for professionals.

The article reached over 88,000 people and was republished by Times of India Blogs. It was widely shared and discussed, reaching readers in 29 Indian states and 34 countries worldwide, including key decision-makers, funders, and policymakers.



The good news about the power of FCC was shared by Dr. Nandita at **Goa Pedicon 2024** – the annual conference of the Goa State Chapter of the Indian Academy of Paediatrics (IAP), reaching over 50 paediatricians.

BUILDING BRIDGES ACROSS INDIA

Sethu's strengths based, neurodiversity affirming, FCC approach resounds in everything we do. On completion of the IAP Fellowship in Developmental and Behavioural Paediatrics at Sethu in October 2024, **Dr Nilanjan Majumdar** from Tripura became the first official developmental paediatrician in his state.

Sethu's IAP Fellow for 2024-25, **Dr Rucha Mehta** from Jamnagar is developing an innovative child-friendly interview and planning tool based on the F-words of childhood disability to strengthen self awareness and collaborative decision making in young children with disabilities.

Ummeed Child Development Centre, Mumbai partnered with Sethu for the **4th ECHO ADHD programme**, training 130 doctors across India. The **CDC Thiruvananthapuram** online programme empowered 17 health care professionals with knowledge and skills in child sexuality development, safety and autonomy.

CULTURE OF LEARNING

Learning never stops at Sethu, whether it's building skills, questioning old habits, or deepening understanding.

Our Speech and Language Pathologist, Anjali Barretto, is among Goa's first officially certified therapists for the **Avaz AAC** (Augmentative and Alternative Communication) app. Over the year, 21 children were supported through 84 AAC sessions, and the tool was also integrated into therapy for children developing verbal language. Every non-speaking child in her sessions experienced the power of AAC—finding new ways to express themselves, connect, and participate.

This year also saw team members applying the **ADDIE** (Analysis, Design, Development, Implementation, and Evaluation) model to design training modules for our Childhood Sexuality and Beautiful Brain programmes.

Dr. Nilanjan Majumder (Paediatrician, IAP Fellow) presented a poster on **"The clinical patterns and service delivery processes for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder in children referred to a community-based child development & family guidance facility in Goa"** at the 21st National Conference of IAP chapter of Neurodevelopmental Paediatrics in Bangalore.



We also launched a team **Book Club** to deepen reflective practice and spark meaningful change. Uniquely Human by Barry Prizant served as a powerful foundation, expanding our understanding of neurodiversity-affirming, strengths-based approaches. It transformed not just our knowledge, but also our attitudes—strengthening the way we connect with children and families.

Aileen De Souza, our Psychologist & Zamora Da Silva, our Counsellor from the Mental Health Team attended a training in Maitri - a 7 session **online parent wellness programme** based on the principles of Acceptance & Commitment Therapy (ACT). The training conducted by Centre for Child Development & Disabilities, Bangalore has equipped our clinicians to use principles of ACT in our parent well-being sessions.

Making Information Family Friendly: Handouts and Translations

Based on feedback from user families, handouts were translated into Hindi, improving access and incorporating key aspects of FCC.

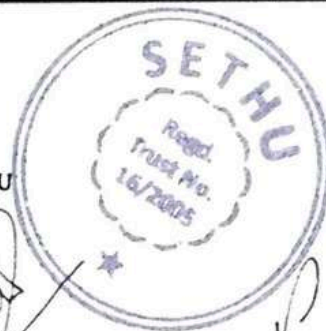




