support of well wishers and the dedicated commitment of the Amar Jyoti team, we were able to face the challenges boldly. This indomitable spirit brought laurels to the institution.

The Institute of Physiotherapy, affiliated with the University of Delhi, made us proud by the results of Bachelor's and Master's course in Physiotherapy. Four students of MPT and five students of BPT passed with distinction and secured positions in the merit list, a tradition that has been maintained for the past many years.

The results of our students at the Teachers Training Centre in Special Education also gave us reasons to feel proud. All the students of D.Ed (HI) cleared the exam in first division. The Head of the department, Dr. Jignya Shah, was awarded PhD from University of Mumbai. The students of other courses of D.Ed in Visual Impairment and Intellectual Disabilities also passed in first division and secured distinctions. All the exams were conducted offline successfully.

Mrs. Seema Tuli, Principal and Director Academics, cleared her papers of the first semester of her course from Glasgow University, UK, for the degree in M.Sc Education.

The students of Amar Jyoti School were promoted as per instructions received from the Directorate of Education. Ms. Bhakti Sharma (Hearing Impaired) student of class VIII was selected for International Rifle shooting competition. Ms. Prachi Yadav, former student of Amar Jyoti School in Gwalior was selected for Paralympics held in Tokyo. She is the first woman paracanoe athlete from India to participate in this event.

The Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment nominated the Founder & Managing Secretary as a member of the National Award Committee and the Expert Committee to examine the need for certain compliances in RPWD Act, 2016.

The Hon'ble Minister of Human Resource and Development also nominated the undersigned as a member of Executive Committee of Samagra Shiksha.

Dr. Uma Tuli was again nominated by the Rajya Sabha as a member of the Internal Complaint Committee set up under the Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013.

In collaboration with the Rehabilitation Council of India, Mrs. Seema Tuli, coordinated a one day interaction "Samvaad", to connect the National Institutes with Teacher Training Institutes and RCI members.

The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment has been supportive, as always, in releasing the grant-in-aid for the integrated



school as well as distribution of assistive devices. The grant is given on the recommendation from Government of NCT Delhi, for which we are extremely grateful.

To make us energy efficient, Manpower Group Services India Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai extended full support in installing a solar plant at our centre in Delhi. In addition to this, they also sponsored the renovation of Occupational Therapy Department, establishment of 6 Extra Marks Classroom and creation of accessible e-learning text books for students with disabilities. The Ford Foundation made online teaching and learning easy by sponsoring Tablets for 400 students. They also helped in distribution of sanitization kits to all the students.

The Hans Foundation is continuing their support for our school in Gwalior. The Essel Foundation, Info Edge (India) Ltd., ACTL, Mash Studio, IC Trust, Indian American Education Foundation and Mr. Vinod Sagar Jain's Trust have been regularly supporting educational activities. Mrs. Prema Mehra sponsored for 100 Tablets for the centre in Gwalior. The National Institute of the Empowerment of Persons with Hearing Impairment, Mumbai provided 51 hearing aids to our school students at Gwalior. We are indebted to the LIC for sponsoring the installation of the fire fighting system at our Gwalior centre.

The Delhi Langar Seva Society generously contributed for upgradation of Amar Jyoti medical care unit, Delhi.

We are deeply grateful to individual philanthropists, donors and sponsors for their constant encouragement and help in sustaining the activities. In the context of dwindling donations during the pandemic, their hand holding has been most timely.

Amar Jyoti School for Inclusive Education


The concept and unique model of inclusion pioneered by Amar Jyoti by introducing inclusive education, pre-vocational skill development training, medical facilities, integrated sports and cultural activities within the same campus has been very successful since its inception in 1981. This holistic approach towards education has been a torch bearer for several organizations nationally and internationally.

The current global situation due to the Covid-19 pandemic led to significant concerns and challenges regarding health (mental and physical) and education of children with or without disabilities. The long closure of the school impacted students, teachers, and families. The pandemic made us realize the need for accessible Teaching Learning Materials

(TLMs) for students with cross-disabilities. For example, our students with visual impairments depend upon tactile stimuli for their activities but many do not have accessible technological support at home due to economic conditions. Similarly, children with hearing impairments need accessible teaching material in signlanguage which is not easily available. The staff and management took up the challenge to ensure that no student, irrespective of whether they have disability or not was left behind.

The total strength of the school this year was 461 students (275 able bodied and 186 with cross disabilities in mainstream classes from class Nursery to VIII, Preparatory sections for visually impaired, hearing impaired, deafblind and students with intellectual challenges.

Ensuring access to technology: Distribution of I-Pads

In the time of total lockdown, we were entirely dependent on technology for all our activities. The biggest challenge was lack of accessible technology, especially for persons with disabilities from the low-economic strata of society. Most of the families of our children with special needs (CwSN) do not have the

financial capacity to afford android phones /laptops/tabs.

We approached various organizations for technological support for our students. The Ford Foundation graciously contributed for procurement of iPads for distribution to all our students. This has given them access to technology.

Conducting online classes for inclusive group of students

Our team of special educators has been working relentlessly to ensure that all information material is accessible for all children especially for those with cross-disabilities.

Since the teachers were not trained in how to use technology to conduct online classes, the training sessions were organized for them by The NIIT Foundation on how to create accessible online teaching material. They were oriented about the use of applications like 'Inshot' to create the online material. This enabled them to reach out to almost all our students, with or without disabilities. Regular follow-up sessions were conducted to clear doubts. These efforts were very well received by the parents and the students.

Realizing the gravity of the situation, the students were given information about the pandemic and were shown videos to create awareness on the importance of hygiene prior to the lockdown. The school principal organized special sessions for parents, students and major stakeholders to create awareness about the pandemic, social distancing, use of masks and sanitizers.

We organized online training sessions on how to make masks at home using the materials available at home. Ms. Kumudini Vardhan, volunteered to conduct online classes for the students to motivate them to make their own masks and even for their family members. To motivate our students on online mask making competition was organized.

Online physical fitness activities

The most important aspect of the holistic approach followed at Amar Jyoti has been involvement of the students in various inclusive Physical Activities (PA). This was greatly disrupted due to the unprecedented closure of schools and led to concerns regarding their overall well-being. To ensure better fitness and improved cognitive health of the students, various online yoga and fitness activities were

conducted during the pandemic. Students were encouraged to follow a daily routine of specially designed exercises for inclusive group of students which were shared through videos and live sessions on Google meet and Zoom. The sports co-ordinator was in constant touch with the parents and students to ensure that the PAs were practiced by them on a regular basis.


Online Fit-India movement

In order to create awareness about importance of fitness, especially during the pandemic, the school organized an online Fit-India Movement wherein various activities like yogic exercises, surya namaskar, balancing development exercise, stairs Up and Down, running on the

spot, jumping jacks, push-up variation exercise, knee push-up, simple push-up, shoulders touch push-up, spider man push-up etc were demonstrated online and students were encouraged to practice them on regular basis at home.

National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS)

Amar Jyoti is an accreditated organiation for conducting academic classes for grades III, V, VIII, X and XII. We also have recognition from NIOS to conduct vocational courses in Computer Applications and Cutting and Tailoring. This has enabled the students with challenges to continue their education through flexible and sustainable access to quality education and skill development.

Online medical interventions

Students with disabilities need medical/ therapeutic interventions (speech therapy, occupational therapy, physiotherapy) on a regular basis. These were greatly affected due to the pandemic. Major challenge faced was the disruption in support services required for their rehabilitation. This resulted in serious medical issues amongst CwSN.

Speech therapy / Psychological assessment

The department of speech therapy conducted sessions via telephonic mode / virtual mode and did tele-practice for children with hearing impairment. The sessions involved a suite of therapeutic exercises including motor exercises, listening, speaking, reading and writing. Assessments were also done, and as per the report individualized intervention plans were made. The recorded videos of patients were assessed regularly to evaluate progress. Regular counselling sessions were held for the students and parents to motivate them during these tough times.

The school counsellor has been in regular touch with the parents and students to address their various emotional / psychological issues. This has been a major area of concern since the outset of the pandemic.

Centre for Special Education (Teacher Training Department)

The Centre for special education has been running teacher training diploma courses in special education for RCI approved courses – D.Ed in Hearing Impairment (HI), Visual Impairment (VI) and Intellectual Challenges. We have been successful in training professionals not only in handling nuances of managing individuals with specific disability but also with cross disabilities. Online classes and practical sessions were conducted for Diploma Teacher Trainees. Technology based training


The curriculum of Diploma in Special Education



All the 85 teacher trainees of the three RCI approved diploma courses made us proud with their outstanding academic performance.


D.Ed special education HI 2018-20

IGNOU Special Study Centre

The Indira Gandhi National Open University's study centre at Amar Jyoti is the largest study centre in Delhi. The centre has an enrolment of over 5478 learners in the current year under various graduate, post-graduate, diploma and certificate programmes. A team of 40 well-qualified and dedicated academic counsellors have been conducting regular counselling sessions as per the university norms.

During the pandemic, the centre organized Induction Meeting for new learners and also held online counselling and grievance redressal sessions. The staff was in regular contact with the learners through phone calls, SMSs, WhatsApp, and Facebook page to cater to their educational needs.

Academic achievements

The annual results of the students enrolled in various courses run by the centre are very encouraging with 75% students clearing the MLIS-5, MAPC-7, BCOMG-15 and BSW-10 in TEE December 2020 examination. Our graduate

students have been placed in reputed MNCs like Genpact, Wipro, Indigo Airlines, government departments like defence and navy services and government hospitals.

Activities organized

Our study centre has organized three online Master of Library and Information Science (MLIS) Seminars on 'Digital Library' and 'Library and Information Centers' through our well qualified and experienced faculty. This enabled the students to enhance their skills in handling

computer programmes such as LibreOffice suite, KOHA and Greenstone Digital Library software. Mr. V K Gautam, Indraprastha College, University of Delhi, also conducted a session which was attended by 105 students.

The Amar Jyoti medical wing provides regular out patient department (OPD) services along with physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy and early intervention. There are 15 consultants from various medical disciplines who are rendering voluntary services on a regular basis.

In view of the ongoing pandemic and a long period of lockdown/ restrictions, limited services could be provided following all the prescribed safety guidelines. All efforts were made to provide medical and related services like radiology, pathology etc. The department provided services to 20,672 patients through its various units.

Department of Physiotherapy

The physiotherapy department did a remarkable job in maintaining services within the constraints imposed by the pandemic. Once the lockdown was lifted, the department started attending to the patients following the covid protocols like maintaining safe social distance and practising regular sanitization. In a short period of time we were able to resume services to over 15-20 patients every day.

Apart from that we continued to serve the community at large by providing free consultancy services on phone and sharing simple home exercise program videos to those who were unable or unwilling to step out. Patients were reassured not to feel let down

and abandoned at any point in the process. This was a great accomplishment in the extraordinary year.

Special appreciation goes to our therapists who provided care for their patients in the time of uncertainty.

We also worked on enhancing our skills by attending online webinars hosted by Society of Indian Physiotherapists (SIP) every week. The Institute of Physiotherapy in collaboration with Society of Indian Physiotherapists organized SIP-e-CON which trained professionals to exchange information to improve clinical practice and research. This programme was attended by our faculty.

Occupational Therapy


The occupational therapy (OT) department has been successfully catering to the needs of Amar Jyoti students with cross-disabilities and members of the community using the latest technology for evaluation, diagnosis and treatment of patients of all age groups. The challenges faced by the patients due to physical, pycho-social and cognitive impairments were handled by the professionals to promote the health and well being of the

individuals. The department not only offers therapeutic services to the school children of Amar Jyoti but also caters to the needs of members of the community. School children who have problems with hand functions, balance, coordination, activities of daily living, functional mobility are also provided appropriate therapies. The deafblind children at Amar Jyoti school are given sensory stimulation therapy.

Dr. Susan Ryan , our Patron, continued to provide valuable guidance to the department on various issues.

The OT team has been planning the sessions as per the following process:

Occupational therapy process





As most of the children with disabilities depend upon OT services for their holistic development, the department conducted online OT sessions for the beneficiaries. The major stakeholders were initially trained to enable them to assist their wards in conducting these exercises at home.

The team provides quality OT services by not just giving therapies to children but also by educating the family about environmental, social, occupational and health factors.

Occupational therapists follow an individual assessment through activity analysis. The goal directed tasks are formulated with special consideration to the intervention program of the individual beneficiaries. The adaptations, modifications and exercises are designed to enhance independent performance. Follow up is maintained through parents - therapist meetings and customized online programs.

Speech Therapy Department

The speech therapy department renders rehabilitative services to persons with speech and hearing impairment. Intervention services are provided to every age group from child to adult, including the geriatric population. The services are not only given to differently-abled people but to also to persons without physical disability who have speech and voice-related issues. Students receive the services as per their assessment during the school hours. In addition, the resources of the speech therapy department are made available through the OPD.

Beneficiaries of different speech and language related problems such as delayed speech and language disorders, fluency disorder, speech-sound error, voice disorder, hearing impairment, cerebral palsy, autism, ADHD, down syndrome and neuro-communication disorders attend speech therapy sessions.

Speech and language assessment are done at the initial visit with different assessment tools such as REELS-Receptive and Expressive Emergent Language Scale, PAT-Photo articulation test, Weiss & Curtis, SECS-Scale of early communication skills (depending upon the condition of the client) and further a therapy plan is made and accordingly follow-up visits are planned.

The therapy techniques (Auditory verbal therapy (AVT), Oral motor therapy - Language intervention therapy - Articulation therapy) are implemented at the clinic and the caregivers of the beneficiaries are taught how to follow them up at home.

During the Covid-19 lockdown, tele-practice was adapted for the students of Amar Jyoti school. Through tele-therapy sessions, a suite of therapeutic exercises including oromotor exercises, listening, speaking, reading were provided. Assessments were also done, and as per report, intervention plans were made. The recorded videos of patients were assessed from time to time to evaluate progress.

Along with services of speech therapy, audiological testing and tympanometry is also done in this department. Recommendations are given to clients as per their provisional diagnosis and counselling is done for the observed conditions.

Child Guidance Clinic

The Child Guidance Clinic is a specialized clinic that deals with children with different levels of intelligence, exhibiting a range of behavioural and psychological challenges. It provides comprehensive intensive mental and health services for children and their families. This includes assessment through which we work with children to evaluate their behaviour, personalities and capabilities through interviews, observations, administering a questionnaire and psychological testing to develop a complete picture of the child. The aim is to empower individuals, families and groups to accomplish mental health, wellness, education and career goals.

Psychometric testing such as assessing development quotient, social quotient, intellectual quotient, and autism spectrum and learning disability are used for screening and diagnosis. Psychological tools such as Malin's intelligence scale for children, Binet Kamat Test,

VSMS, ISAA, Kauffman Assessment battery for children, SLD- Comprehensive diagnostic battery, Vineland Adaptive Behaviour scale are utilised as needed. Psychological assessment helps to diagnose the child's behavioural issues. Counselling to manage behavioural issues, life stressors, poor academic performance, learning difficulties, relationship issues, internet-addiction, self-conflicts, childhood-trauma, social phobia, issues related to attention and hyperactivity is made available as per need. Our services include individual counselling, parental counselling, family counselling, career counselling, group counselling, behaviour modification etc.

We have been conducting case studies with the school principal, teachers, occupational therapists, speech therapists, physiotherapists, psychologists and early interventionist on regular basis to discuss the challenges faced with the beneficiaries and to prepare plans for their holistic development.

Early Intervention Programme (EIP)

The EIP department is providing services and support to infants and young children with developmental delays and disabilities and their families. It caters to the needs of children between the age group of 0 to 6 years. The specialised programme includes speech therapy, physiotherapy and occupational therapy based on the needs of the child. The strategies depend on the type of severity of challenges and the condition of the child. The assessments are more formal and may involve standardized testing materials or equipment.

We conduct periodic review of the services and assessments to determine the efficacy of the intervention and the required modifications are made to ensure the optimum success of the interventions.

Department of **Prosthetics and Orthotics**

The department of prosthetics and orthotics has been rendering rehabilitative services by providing appropriate mobility aids and assistive devices to persons with disabilities. It designs, fabricates latest and light weight assistive devices. Aids and appliances are provided to restore mobility of persons with disabilities and help them to carry on their activities of daily living independently and improve their quality of life. At our centre in Delhi and Gwalior mobility aids are provided free of cost to school children and to economically weaker sections of the society under the ADIP scheme of Ministry of Social

Justice & Empowerment, Government of

Due to Covid-19 pandemic, routine and regular rehabilitative services were disrupted. We were able to organize two camps for distribution of aids and appliances up to March, 2021.

Five camps were held in different districts of Delhi in the month of July, 2021 under ADIP scheme of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India. Followup camps and home visits were conducted to get feedback from the beneficiaries who had been provided mobility aids.

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Skill Development Training

Skill development training like art and craft, cutting and tailoring, pottery, artificial jewellery making and computer is an integral part of the curriculum of school students to develop prevocational skills from class III onwards. The department is also providing training to women, disadvantaged groups and to economically weaker sections of the community to empower them to become self-sufficient to face the challenges of life.

Sudden onset of Covid-19 initially posed challenges in conducting the classes online but we were successful in gradually preparing accessible videos and lesson plans to ensure that the training sessions could be conducted on a regular basis.

Art and craft department

Students were trained in making the following products through online portal:

- Paper craft: carry bag with different types of paper (news paper, brown paper, craft paper, handmade paper).
- + Envelops
- + Penstand.
- + Gift wraping.
- Decorative products made out of waste materials.

Pottery department

The department has been successful in enhancing the sensory skills of the CwSN. Various types of pots, gullak (piggy bank), elephant, bird, gas cylinder shapes, bird feeder, decorative hangings, incense stand, planters etc were designed during the session.

Cutting/tailoring and jute-bag making

Vocational training in cutting and tailoring and the making of jute bags empower the community members to lead a life of dignity. The department has been creating new, innovative and attractive products. Different types of bags (office and regular), table cloth, coasters, household products etc. are made.

The courses place great emphasis on basic techniques and new fashion trends. We also have accreditation from National Institute of Open Schooling to run the basic course in cutting and tailoring.

Computer department

The computer training department has been enhancing the IT skills of not only the school students but also the members of the community, women and geriatric population through its various courses. The department runs a one-year diploma in computer applications (DCA) and a number of short-term courses like MS – Office, Desktop Publishing, Web Designing and Tally – a financial accounting software. These softwares are upgraded from time to time.

Pandemic and lockdown brought its own challenges. We had to conduct online classes which was a challenge initially. We contacted the parents and students to prepare them to attend classes in online mode. It was a tough job to convince them to take classes online. For instructors the challenge was to prepare

lessons and videos for conducting theory and practical sessions. Sessions were organised to get the feedback and clear the doubts of the students. Special classes were conducted for some of the students in the evening as well. The department made special efforts through counselling sessions to persuade the students and parents to continue their course. This effort was successful to a large extent.

It is a matter of pride that five of our students got placement in well known establishments / organisations.

Social Work Department

The social work department has been an integral part of the Trust since its inception in 1981. Home visits are conducted on regular basis and parents are called for interaction and are counselled regarding various issues like seasonal diseases, health care and are given orientation on activities of daily living such as personal hygiene. The identified beneficiaries were referred to clinics and hospitals for further investigations and management whenever needed. From 1990 onwards students of Bachelors of Social Work (BSW) and Masters of Social Work (MSW) courses from University of Delhi or other institutions and various colleges started coming to Amar Jyoti for practical exposure.

Social Work Department offered online internships to students studying for various courses. The department also engaged in multifarious assignments all through the year. These include:

- Orientation of visitors, groups of students, donors, volunteers, interns about the objectives and activities of Amar Jyoti emphasizing the concept of inclusive education.
- Monitoring, guiding and supervising interns and volunteers of Master in Social Work and Bachelor in Social Work courses.

- Networking with NGO, schools and liaisoning with corporate sector.
- Update and maintain register of individual and perpetuity donors, visitors, interns and volunteers.
- Submission of profile and progress reports to respective donors to apprise them about students supported by them.
- Sending photographs, X-mas greeting cards and annual essay on friendship to International Hilfsfonds organization (Germany).
- Contacting alumni and recording their achievements. Provision of information to individuals and parents regarding concessions, reservations, scholarships, loans and disability certificates.
- Counseling persons with disabilities and their parents, sensitizing them about the relevant social welfare schemes, and where necessary, referring them to appropriate organizations.
- Maintaining necessary data of students in central file during admission process.
- Information dissemination and referrals to information seekers telephonically.
- Participating and assisting in organizing medical camps organised by Orthotic and Prosthetic department.
- Coordination with all the departments of the organization.

Amar Jyoti School and Rehabilitation Centre, Gwalior

Amar Jyoti is running an inclusive school in Gwalior since 1989, where over 360 children with and without disabilities are studying together in equal numbers. All students are assured equal opportunities and full participation in all school activities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic regular classes/activities were not conducted in school but online classes were conducted through many accessible apps. The members of staff were trained in the use of technology through a special sessions organized by the NIIT Foundation on the use of various platforms for E-Learning like Google meet, Zoom. The teachers have been preparing lesson plans by incorporating sign language, inclusive videos, captioning, inserting appropriate pictures and text in the videos with the help of various apps like In-shot, kinemaster, ex-recorder, Youtube.




Ensuring digital accessibility through distribution of I-pads



The total strength of the school this year was 360 students (222 able bodied and 138 with cross disabilities) in mainstream classes from class KG to VIII. In addition we have preparatory sections for visually impaired, hearing impaired and students with intellectual challenges.

Therapeutic intervention and medical care Health camps

In collaboration with RJN Apollo Spectra hospital two health camps were organized on January 18, 2021 and February 26, 2021. Full precaution of safety, social distancing and sanitization were taken. A team of seven doctors including Ophthalmologist, Gynaecologist, Homeopath, and Physiotherapist rendered their services. A total of 475 patients registered for these camps.

One hundred and eighty spectacles, and 187 seven dental kits were distributed and 27 people were operated for cataract during the camp. Twelve wheelchairs, 45 tricycles, eight walking sticks and twelve crutches were also distributed amongst the members of the community.

Physiotherapy and speech therapy

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant and far-reaching impact on children globally. With playgrounds being sealed and schools becoming virtual, children have been restricted to their homes. The prolonged confinement at home has resulted in a substantial increase in screen-time and decrease in physical activity in students.

Ensuring the continuum of care during the

pandemic posed several challenges to physical therapists because most physical therapy interventions for children with disabilities require close contact and physical handling of the child. Still, our therapist provided home based therapy to the students online and trained their parents to do some basic exercises. Here is the graphs of OPDs given mentioned below
