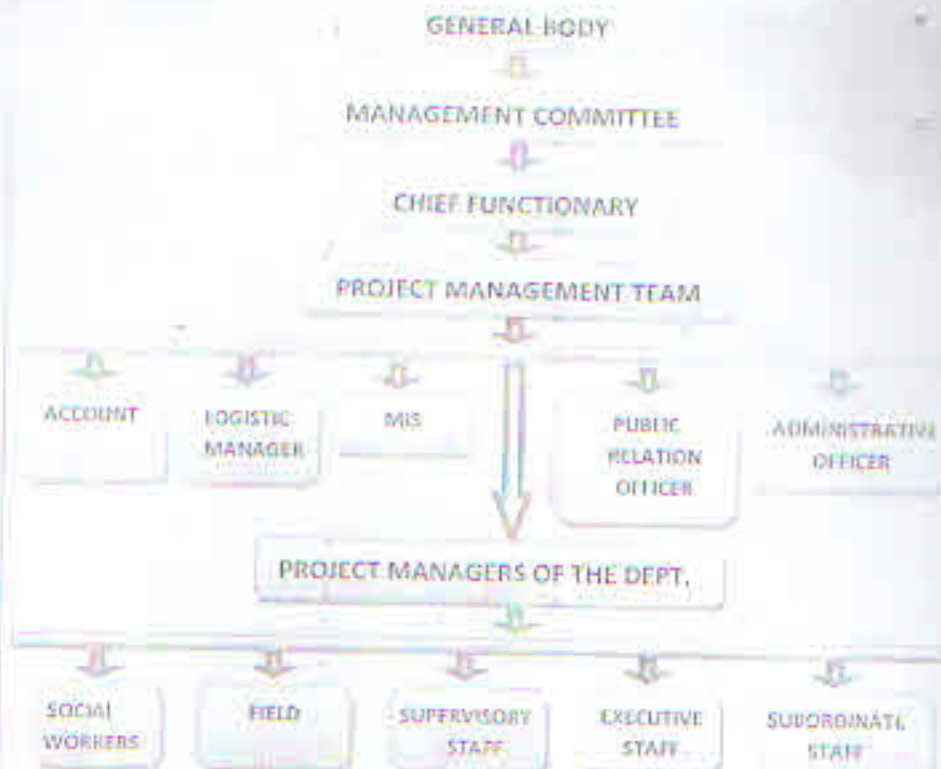

Constructed over an area of a.27.00 acres of own land and more than 1.25 Gadi. Sd. built up space including a satisfactory asset base to operationalise the different projects in an ambient environment including all basic amenities for residential units and offices etc. Other than the day to day usable like office equipment, furniture & fixtures more over the organization holds 03 crores fixed assets as on 31.03.2020. The organization is surrounded with lovely coconut trees and vast Green paddy fields. The whole environment splashes the typical fragrance of rural habitation where the Soul of India lives in.

Keeping Seva (service to mankind) and Daya (sympathy & empathy to destitute and marginalized) as core values for social actions, the organization since its birth has involved in several welfare and developmental activities in unlearning the concerns, issues and problems affecting the marginalized and disadvantaged sections of the society at grass root level.

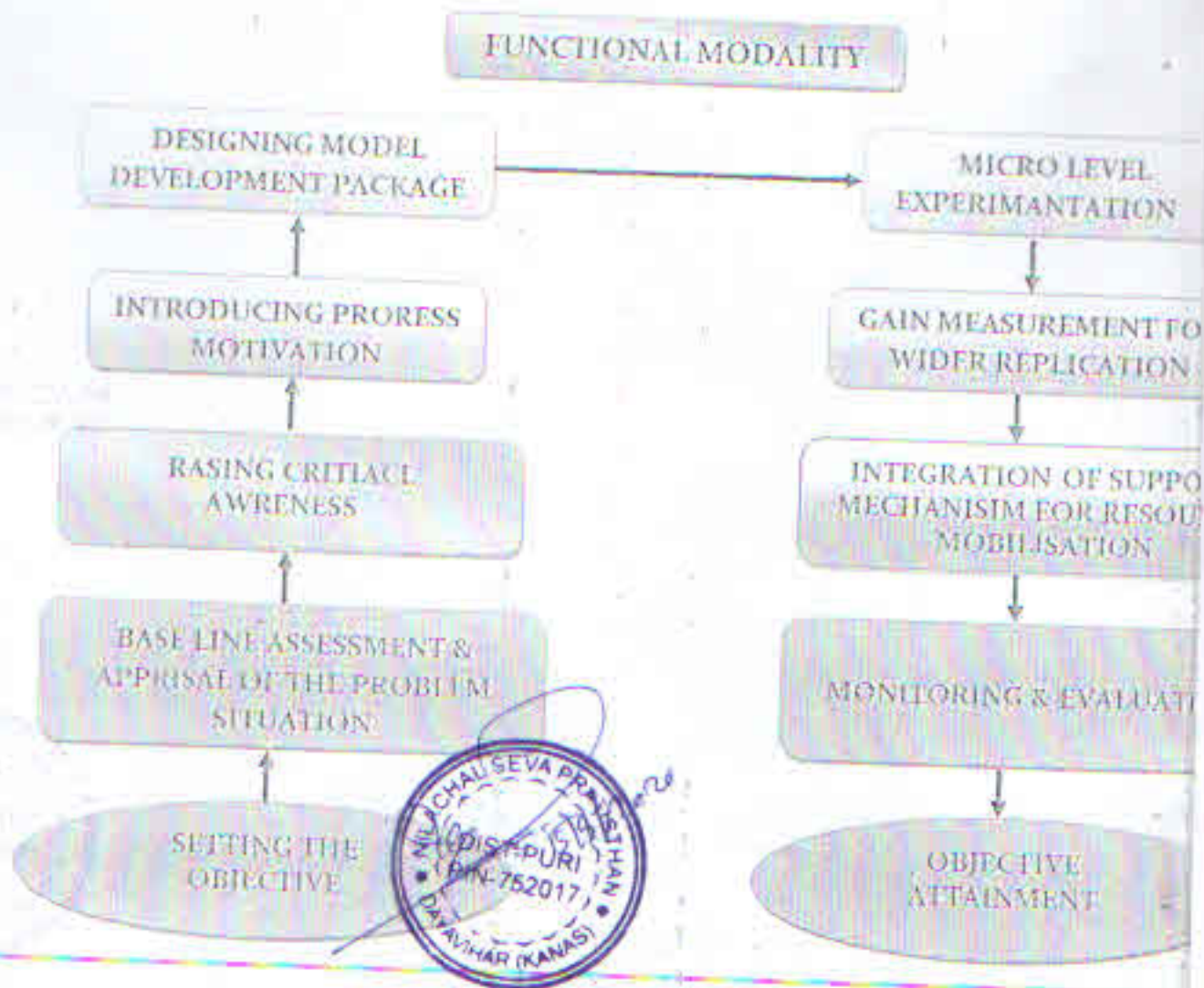

Annual Activity Report (2019-20)

Niruchal Seva Pratisthan (NSP) deals with the social security and employment of extremely vulnerable population. The target population includes persons with disabilities, senior citizens, victims of natural distress & trafficked women, youth; children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law. The welfare of target groups, NSP operates a number of projects. There also exists important protective measures to secure the interest of the target groups. The target groups suffer from educational backwardness and social disadvantages such as marginalization from society, discrimination, exploitation, abuse, depression, anger and health disorder etc. NSP aims to work towards their social integration by ending their exploitation, building a congenial social environment and enhancing their capacity by providing them suitable support, refining their skills, engaging them in productive activities and recognizing their contribution to the society. In order to achieve the objectives NSP is busy in implementing several projects to address the concern of a variety of issues. While some of the projects have been supported by different Government or non-Government giving agencies, some have been implemented by its own efforts.

And when the project-objectives vary from project to project, each project follows typical guidelines for its implementation and objective attainment. However, a common conceptual framework highlighting the different alternative mechanism lie inherently in each of the intervention sectors to justify the need and efficacy of involvement. Thus we can broadly fit into a method or strategy, which primordial reflects the participatory micro level planning and implementation. To reach at this consensus in generality, the strategy follows the following sequence with a bottom-top-bottom approach.

Benefits offered

The organizational support like free fooding and medical facilities, recreational facilities and productive engagement or possible income making and provides homely atmosphere as per daily routine. There is a system of doctor's check-up thrice a week for necessary treatment and medication. Morning and evening prayer, yoga, reading Books & Magazines, watching T.V., indoor games like playing Cards, Chess, Dice etc. are regular seen. They are at times taken for outing/ sight-seeing and tourist places as per their wishes. They also observe different festivals at the home(s) like Holi, Karik Brata etc.

NSP with due efforts restored total 35 cuses to their respective families after due conciliation with their family members. 11 inmates died (04 Nos. at Dayavihar + 07Nos. at Sukal) centres during the year. Necessary last rights and funeral activities were done as per their social and religious customs. As yet NSP has sheltered 750 Nos. of older destitute in the Homes since inception, who have been able to lead their lives in a rejuvenated manner with peace and contentment in the above OAs.

Activity undertaken as per programme component:

Prevention

Under this component, 02 nos. of Community Vigilance group have been formed in Bramhapuri and Debag Blocks of Puri district. 2 days Sensitization workshop has been organized. Awareness generation through performance of street plays (10 Nos.) have been made. Printed IEC materials on the measures of combating the trafficking have been distributed in the above two vulnerable blocks.

Rescue

During the year, 07 rescue operations have been made out of which 17 victims have been rescued in different occasions on obtaining proper information of trafficking victims. They were given immediate relief on rescue by providing basic amenities and medical aid.

Rehabilitation

As a measure of rehabilitation, the organisation has set up a Protective & Rehabilitation Home at NSP campus where all the inmates were sheltered with adequate facilities of clothing, medical care etc. Apart from this, necessary legal aid are provided to the inmates in course of trial of their cases. During their stay, suitable formal education, vocational training and Text-Books, Note-Books, Uniform etc. have been provided. Besides that, 26 inmates were provided with vocational training in Applique and Tailoring, Knitting work and Ceramics.

Reintegration

During the year 2019-20, a total number of 22 victims after completion of their trial and education reintegrated to society through rehabilitation Policy- (4) restored to family (16 Nos.) + Self-Employment (01 Nos.) + 01 cases left with arranged marriage + 04 in service & 01 case reintegrated through suitable placement.

Progressive Outcome of the Programme

From the starting the project 108 are rescued out of which 50 are still continuing for purpose of getting rehabilitation. Rest 258 victims have rehabilitated under rehabilitation policy like Reunited to family, Parents/Self-employment including seed money, half share etc.

IV. DISABILITY REHABILITATION:

Over the years since independence, addressing the needs of the disabled especially in the rural setting has been a big issue and matter of concern. The PWDs have not attained the desired level of development in the country as expected. NSP with its focused approach, has intervened into this aspect and has put effort in rehabilitation through community based rehabilitation, institutional care, special education, vocational training, creating human resources for the disabled, providing assistive devices to the PWDs etc. Since 1992, NSP has provided education and training to 1860 PWDs, provided assistive devices to 385 PWDs, facilitated Community Based Rehabilitation programme to 100 PWDs and created 150 human resources for the disabled. Cater the need of special educators for the country. The detailed activity report for the year 2020-21 is as under.

Training Curriculum

RCI approved course curriculum has been prepared for the students and accordingly, they are taught for Theory and Practical classes. Seminars, Exposure visits to different Schools/Rehabilitation Projects, Participation in Community Meeting, Medical Camps and Community Development Programmes etc, were also organized during the year.

Continuing Rehabilitation and Education (CRE)

A Continuing Rehabilitation and Education (CRE) programme was conducted for 30 RCI registered professionals on "Multisensory Approaches in Pre School Education".

Advanced Certificate Course in Inclusive Education (ACCIE)

A six months RCI approved "Advanced Certificate Course in Inclusive Education (ACCIE)" was conducted for 30 in-service Special Educators from February 2018 to July 2018. There are about 26 candidates completed the course and get 100 CRE point for renewal of their registration in Central Rehabilitation Register of RCI.

Internship Program

DR MISHRA INSTITUTE FOR ADVANCE STUDIES IN SPECIAL EDUCATION AND TECHNOLOGY, KODALA, GANJAM visited our training centre for one month practical internship training programme towards obtaining practical experience.

Educational Visit

College of Social Work, Kamptee, Nagpur, Maharashtra visited our training Centre on February 4th, 2019 towards their educational tour and the B.Ed-SE(MR) students of PRADIP CENTRE FOR AUTISM, Kolkata visited the Training Centre on 29th March 2019.

The training could be able to create 366 successful resources during last 7 years of its functioning. Most of them have been able to engage themselves as teachers in SSA under inclusive setup and Special School.

d. ADVANCE CERTIFICATE COURSE IN INCLUSIVE EDUCATION:

By accreditation from Rehabilitation Council of India a six months Advance Certificate Course on Inclusive Education (Cross Disabilities) in face to face mode was started during the month of February 2018 (February-July 2018 Batch) for pass out Diploma/Bachelor in Education Special education candidates. The successful candidates shall be awarded 100 CRE points for renewal of their registration in Central Rehabilitation Register of RCI. The intake capacity of the course is minimum 15 and maximum 30. Theory and Practical examination of the said course shall be conducted by the National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPM), Chennai.

e. CONTINUING REHABILITATION EDUCATION PROGRAMME (CRE):

A five days CRE programme i.e. from 14-18 March 2018, on "Multisensory Approaches in Pre School Education" was conducted at Disability Rehabilitation and Training Centre, Nilimal Siva Pratishthan at Dayasihar, Kanus, Dist. Puri to educate the Special Educators, Resource Teachers and Rehabilitation professionals on "Multisensory Approaches in Pre School Education". The programme was attended by 30 Special Teachers/Special Educators, Block Resource Teachers, Regular School teachers of different districts of Odisha such as Angul, Bhubaneswar, Boudh, Cuttack, Gajapati, Kalahandi, Kandhamal, Kendrapara, Khordha, Koraput and Puri and 06 Resource Persons to develop and disseminate concept, Rationales, Types & approaches, Strategies, Planning and implementation of multisensory approaches in pre school education.

c. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION (CBR) :

Based on the modality of non-institutional set up, the CBR programme has been established with an aim to empower people with disabilities, their families and communities as a whole regardless of 'cast, colour, creed, religion, gender, age, type and cause of disability through raising awareness, promoting inclusion, reducing poverty, eliminating stigma, meeting basic needs and facilitating access to health, education and livelihood opportunities'. It's essential feature is focused on partnership and community participation. The individual is not isolated from the community. Family members and community volunteers are part of the rehabilitative process. This can help integrate the person into the community, which is prepared to value the unique contribution which the person is able to make.



Keeping in view, the organization has started the Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) programme in Kann & Brahmajil Blocks of Puri district of Odisha State under "Deendayal Disabled Rehabilitation Scheme" of Ministry of S. J. & E. Govt. of India, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, New Delhi. Total 310 nos. of disabled persons has been enrolled and the programme is running with the own efforts of the organization. During the year under report 04 capacity building, HEC and advocacy programmes were organized in both the blocks.

e. SPECIAL SCHOOL FOR ORTHOPEDICALLY HANDICAPPED & WITH SPASTICITY :

It is seen in many a cases, that the Orthopedically Challenged persons are also afflicted having spasticity which multiplies the severity of discomfort in the quality of life of the PWD concerned. There has been no significant improvement in scientific research for remedial of such cases but the rehabilitative services. Thus, intervening into the issue is the highest need of the day.

With such an objective, NSP has established a Special School for the Orthopedically Handicapped who are not able to travel or move around independently since 2014-15 having an intake capacity of 30 PWDs of 40% or more disability located at the HQs. of NSP at Daspur. The services such as education, physiotherapy, behavior modification and assistive devices along with free food, lodging and medical facilities are available in free of cost. Total strength of students-30.

Recently the Govt. of India has sanctioned for 90 trainees in trades like (i) Domestic IT help desk, (ii) Assistant Civil Engineer (level-II), (iii) sewing & operator vide their S.O. No. T.No.8-102/2016-17. The grounding of the training shall be done during 2019-20. In the process, we are involved as State Training Agency for East Zone of Odisha to provide training to the Trainers and Implementers of ASHA- Home Based Newborn Care programme under National Health Mission. 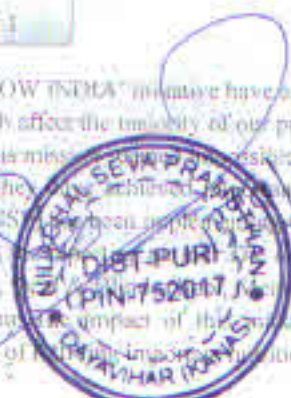

With such an approach, NSP has undertaken various programme like Industrial Training Centre, Community level training centres for skill up gradation. In this vertical NSP has been able to impart skill training to 2621 youths of the state in various trades. The detailed activities are as under:

a. SEPKHO AUR KAMAO (LEARN & EARN):

Progressive Outcome of the Programme

After providing quality and effective training to 720 minority beneficiaries 200 beneficiaries have formed Self Help Groups and engaged in production activity of handicraft goods. They are now able to earn an average income of Rs.200/- (per day) i.e. more than the minimum wages as prescribed in the state. The social impact is also significant to learn that other eligible groups of minority community are inspired to undergo such training programme.

B. INDUSTRIAL TRAINING CENTRE :

Programme Objective

To provide Industrial and Vocational Training for Skill up gradation as approved by National Council for Vocational Training.

Commencement of Programme

The programme was commenced in the year 1999.

Intake Capacity and Admission and Training

There are 8 varieties of trades like Fitter, Plumber, Driver & Mechanic, Sewing Technology (Tailoring), Dairying, Floriculture & Landscaping, Horticulture, Old age Care each having 21 seats meant for the age group of 14 to 40 years for unemployed youths.

The programme have been approved and certified by National Council for Vocational Training, New Delhi. For the total strength of 181 trainees in a year, there is also hostel facility for students reaching from distant places.

Staffing and Resources

Principal, Training Officer, Asst Training Officer, Instructors, Master Craft Person, Designer, Soft Skill Trainer, IT Skill and English language trainers are available in the ITC to impart skill training.

Progressive Outcome of the Programme

The country is in need of Skilled and technical resources all the way. Hence, the passed out students gets immediate jobs in Steel and Power Sector. The trained youth in the field of vocational training have been able to self employed in the activities allied to Agriculture like Dairying, Floriculture, Land Scaping and Horticulture etc. Till date, NSP could be able create more than 362 skilled youth working in various corners of India.



II. VOLUNTARY SOCIAL ACTIONS:

As a part of its proactive participation for social action with a greater sense, NSP has always been advocating to uphold the values of the traditional, social, cultural, economical and ecological themes. In these vertices, the organization has undertaken the following causes with due participation.

KHADI PRODUCTION:

Programme Objective

Khadi Production for preservation and promotion of Indian Tradition and Heritage as a livelihood programme.

Commencement of Programme

The programme was commenced in the year 1978 with the concept of Swadeshi for a self-reliant society by making yarn and clothes from Kapes and promote the uniqueness of India through producing Khadi.

Progressive Outcome of the Programme

NSP is engaged in facilitating production of yarn and clothes as against income generating programme for some rural Cluster Groups in form of SHGs.



1. DAKHYATA VIKAS (Induction cum-GDP-PRJ):

Decentralisation of work, responsibility and the decentralisation of power are some of the main administrative procedures for good governance. The power was vested centrally for execution of policies and various government schemes. The government was directly interacting with the grass root level and different stakeholders at district and state level. But gradually the conception changed and the power was decentralised through the Panchayati Raj system developing local self governments. The members of panchayati raj institutions, sarpanches, members, secretaries and the EOs are the element of the panchayati raj system for the management of the block level affairs of the state policy. But there seems too much difficult situations when the functionaries found unskilled.



They are being elected by the people but they do not know what to do and in which way to benefit the people within their constituency. So NSP organized the programme named as "Dakhyata" for skill development of functionaries of panchayati raj system.

The skill development training programmes were arranged in the training centers of NSP regarding the policy development and early policy implementation, awareness regarding the existing policies and schemes of the government in the welfare of the people, public health approach, rural educational development and the child right protection. The trainings were also conducted on various emergency interventions, involvement & participation of the common people in the planning and decentralization of power at the grass root level and dissemination of the information regarding various government schemes such as NREGA, SGSY, PMRY and other benefiting policies. The PRJ members were also trained on development of accessibility to different departments and administrative blocks. They were also provided information of block regulatory activities. In this way their skill up gradation was undertaken so that they became able to address different need of their constituency addressing the right based approach to any issues.



The community leaders, youth leaders, district administration, district & state level stakeholders and the intellectuals supported this programme towards the successful outcome. Now the people of Kamsa block are getting the facilities from the early implementation of various government schemes, policies and the different programmes in health, education, sanitation and livelihood.

CONSUMER WELFARE AWARENESS:

NSP has organized 10 teaching classes spreading awareness about rights as a consumer of various commodities and awareness regarding bargaining power in terms of deception, loss, mental agony etc. in secondary schools, colleges of Kamsa, Brahmagiri, Satyabadi & Delang blocks of Puri District during 2019-20. And 10 awareness public meetings were organized at Kalyanpur Bazar, Bijapur Bazar, Junkin Bazar, Gola Bazar and NSP campus during Dec-19 and 21st Jan, 2020 for the welfare of the consumer pertaining to various precautionary measures to be taken at the time of purchase of goods and commodities, after purchase services, requirements, warranty & guarantee coverage, legal protection, prevailing law of the land in case of deception and treachery etc. Around 6985 people were covered through the programme. 07 protection groups @ 07 activists in each were formed to carry out the sensitization / action in this regard.



SWACHHA BHARAT ABHIYAN:

Regularly and once in a month (last day of the month) "Swachha Bharat Abhiyan" events were organized at near by Bazar, village in order to maintain a clean environment. The members of NSP, rallies with posters, banners and placards created the awareness among the public and had taken up a regular campaign regarding Swachha Bharat Mission. During 2019-20 about 17 Abhiyan were organized spreading 75 hours @ 5 hours per event.



PEOPLE'S ACTION COMMITTEES FOR AWARENESS (IEC):

At the village, block and the ward levels people's Action committees have constituted (60 PAC are functioning in 10 Gram Panchayats as on 31.03.2020) during the year which will spread awareness about Government Programmes, conduct survey of the target population, identify suitable beneficiaries, facilitate supply of benefits under ongoing Govt. programmes and organize periodic meetings to review the implementation of programmes, foster social bonds among all the stakeholders and neutralize vested interest groups. They will act as a link between the administration, NSP and target groups.

2. CREATING HUMAN RESOURCES:

(a) MASTER IN SOCIAL WORK (MSW):

In the emerging need of revamping the social sector, suitable human resources need to be created throughout the globe. Undertaking the pursuit, NSP has established the Institute of social work as a professional course since 2007 to promote rural voluntarism and professionalization. The institute named as "Regional Institute of Social Work & Research" of Kamsa. The institute is affiliated to Odisha University of Social Sciences and is recognized by Govt. of Odisha. During 2019-20, a total of 10 students enrolled for post graduation in social work. This programme will not only help them in their social work or voluntarism but will also build their future by equipping them with the completion of the study. The students are given exposure visits and rural camps to enhance their knowledge. Till date around 10 students have successfully passed out and placed.



b. DAYAVIHAR JUNIOR COLLEGE (+2) :-
c. DAYAVIHAR DEGREE COLLEGE (+3) :-

Both the colleges are spreading higher secondary as well degree standard education to rural poor students. During 2019-20 around 2140 students were in roll. The pass out status was 97%. Both the colleges are now united by the Deptt. of Higher Education / School & Mass Education Deptt. Start year was 1989-90. These colleges are functioning over 10 acres of land donated by the Nilachal Seva Pratishthan and basically these higher education institutions are the creation of our organization NSP. During 2019-20 the Dayavihar Degree College has awarded B+ by NAAC for promoting quality education as a Beacon Light.



d. JAN SIKHIYAN SANSTHAN (JSS) :-

With the effort of this organization NSP, the JAN SIKHIYAN SANSTHAN (JSS) for the district of Puri is functioning in the district HQs since 2002. Nilachal Seva Pratishthan is the Mother NGO of JSS, Puri. It is functioning now under the support of Min. of HRD, Govt. of India. During 2019-20 this JSS has extended skill training to 1800 unskilled youths in 11 blocks of Puri District.



e. VILLAGE DISASTER MANAGEMENT PLAN (VDMP) :-

The development of Disaster Management Plan at the village level aims at building the capacity and resilience of the community to equip them with skills so that management of various hazards becomes a way of life for them. The document will help the local community to prepare for and to respond to disaster effectively. NSP is organizing this programme since 2019. 43 Nos. of villages in Puri District are covered under this plan during the year. Collector-cum-District Magistrate, Puri (Emergency Section) headed this programme.

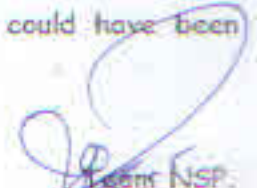
